



Career Updates

Mandy Fulton (BA Honours 2009), PhD is currently working in Toronto at Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital. Dr. Fulton is part of an interdisciplinary team in the Integrated Education and Therapy program within Bloorview School where she provides assessment, diagnostic, and consultation services for children in junior kindergarten through grade one with a range of presenting concerns including intellectual disability, learning disability, and attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder. This role also includes providing consultation services and workshops to parents and staff. Dr. Fulton also works with the Communication Behaviour and Learning team providing diagnostic assessments of children and adolescents with autism spectrum disorder. In addition, Dr. Fulton works with the interdisciplinary team in the Get Up and Go program where she provides intervention for youth with persistent pain who are participating in an intensive four-week treatment. She also co-facilitates cognitive behaviour therapy groups for children and adolescents with Autism Spectrum Disorder and significant anxiety based on the manualized Facing Your Fears program.

Alumnus in the Spotlight

Jean-Christian Maillet (BA Honours 2001), M.Sc.

We are pleased to highlight Jean-Christian Maillet as our **Alumnus in the Spotlight!** Christian completed his Honours in 2001 under the supervision of Dr. Nancy Higgins. He then completed an M.Sc. in Behavioural Neuroscience at Carleton University in Ottawa.

Christian initially pursued a Ph.D. in Neuroscience at the University of Ottawa's Institute Of Mental Health Research; however, a switch in research interests led him towards a career in policy and program evaluation. "The longer I spent in a research environment, the longer I began to question if and how research being conducted in the lab actually had an impact on individuals' health. Every grant application I either read or helped write always claimed that the research would have tangible impacts on people's lives. However, what was absent in these grant applications was the proper measures and indicators through which the impact of that research could be measured." It was this interest in impact assessment and knowledge translation that led Christian to make the difficult choice of leaving his Ph.D. studies and beginning his career at the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) in Ottawa.

At CIHR, Christian has held positions in the design of research initiatives, policy and government relations, and most recently as

an Evaluator with CIHR's Office of Audit and Evaluation. Christian develops systematic approaches to determine if Canada's investments in health research are achieving intended objectives and impacting the lives and health of Canadians. He provides advice to senior management on the continued need for investments in health research, while providing necessary research evidence that will help shape health research and training policies at the national level.

In reflecting on the Honours program, Christian states: "I am really privileged to have been a part of the Honours program at STU. Program Evaluation is strongly rooted in the discipline of Psychology. What makes the STU Honours program so successful is the faculty members that mentor students as they undertake independent research for the first time. The long discussions I have had with many faculty members, particularly Dr. Nancy Higgins, about my thesis, research in psychology, and life in general really cultivated a keen sense of critical thinking and curiosity that stayed with me as a graduate student and now as a Program Evaluator within the federal government."
