CONVOCATION

St. Thomas University's Convocation is a gathering of the university community to confer degrees, present awards and medals, and hear the Address to Graduates and Valedictory. Convocation begins with a processional led by graduating students who are followed by faculty, university officials, and special guests. Each group occupies a designated position and the processional becomes a meeting of the university, the definition of convocation. Modern university attire dates to the Middle Ages when scholars and students were members of religious orders. The Chancellor and the President wear ceremonial St. Thomas University robes designed for their office, while many faculty wear the hoods and gowns of their *alma mater*.

The university bestows honorary degrees on individuals who have been deemed deserving of recognition by a Joint Board of Governors-Senate Committee. Wearing green and gold-trimmed robes, St. Thomas University's colours, the recipients receive hoods symbolizing their degrees. Students who have met the university's academic standards are similarly hooded and formally granted all the honours, rights, and privileges pertaining to their degree.

EAGLE FEATHER

Graduating Indigenous students were gifted with Eagle Feathers at a special ceremony and are carrying their feather as they receive their degree. In Indigenous communities, there is a sacred connection between the Eagle and the Creator as the Eagle flies highest and closest to the Creator and carries human prayers. In "The Story of the Eagle Feather," the Eagle offered one of its feathers to the human family as a sign of continued love and healing and a reminder of the importance of "Sacred Teachings." To be given an Eagle Feather bestows honour and responsibility as it symbolizes being a messenger for respect, truth, courage, and wisdom as passed down by Elders.

Kente Stole

The Black Students' Association has worked with the university to introduce the Kente Stole to Convocation to commemorate the differences and obstacles STU's Black students overcome in order to graduate. Adapted from African tradition in Ghana, this woven cloth, which was once only worn by royalty, is a scarf-like garment worn over the shoulder that represents an accomplishment, graduation, or other rite of passage. The Kente Stole honours the legacy of Black ancestors and is a testament to each graduate's strength and excellence.

HONORARY DEGREE RECIPIENTS

Dr. Mary McCarthy-Brandt is a Fredericton-based writer, educator, and historian dedicated to preserving the histories of Black New Brunswickers. Over the past decade, she has emerged as a prominent public commentator and has promoted greater awareness of the historical and current contributions of Black New Brunswickers. McCarthy-Brandt is a sixth-generation New Brunswicker whose family's roots predate the



founding of the province in 1784. A PhD graduate of the University of Toronto's Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, her scholarly research focused on segregated and forgotten graveyards in New Brunswick. She also served for six years as the president of the New Brunswick Black History Society.

McCarthy-Brandt has been featured in the provincial and regional media for her research locating and restoring abandoned Black cemeteries and her knowledge of the Black experience in New Brunswick. She chairs REACH NB (Remembering Each African Cemeteries History in New Brunswick) which collaborates with the Provincial Archives to locate and document forgotten and abandoned gravesites. In 2015, McCarthy-Brandt won a human rights case against Shoppers Drug Mart for an incident of racial profiling. Her writing was featured in the collection *Black Writers Matter* (University of Regina Press 2019), an anthology of African-Canadian writing on contemporary issues. She was also featured in *Chatelaine Magazine* as one of "33 Black Canadians Making Change Now" for her work identifying systemic and anti-black racism. **Maggie Paul** is a Passamaquoddy elder, teacher, and song carrier who has lived most of her adult life on the St. Mary's First Nation. She is known for her beautiful singing voice, her work preserving traditional songs, and using music to inspire and guide Indigenous youth. For more than 40 years, she has been preserving and resurrecting Passamaquoddy and Wolastogey songs that were once banned by the Gov-



ernment of Canada. Along with Wolastoqyik singer Rok Wiseman, she spent one year listening to recorded songs from the late 1800s and early 1900s that were preserved on wax cylinders in the Canadian Museum of History. As the songs were only accessible in the archives, Paul recorded two albums of these traditional songs and thus returned them to her people. In 2014, she was awarded an Indspire Award in the category of culture, heritage, and art.

Paul also uses music to help young Indigenous people find their voices. Most notably, she mentored Indigenous musician Jeremy Dutcher and when Dutcher accepted the Polaris Prize for his album *Wolastoqiyik Lintuwakonawa* in 2018, he thanked Paul who was also his guest at the awards gala. As Paul once said, "When you bring the songs back, you're going to bring the dances back. You're going to bring the people back. You're going to bring everything back." She has dedicated her life to unearthing and reviving these forgotten melodies to bring them back to her community so that it can feel whole again.

FACULTY AWARDS

JOHN MCKENDY MEMORIAL TEACHING AWARD

Dr. Sarah Vannier of the Department of Psychology teaches courses in introductory psychology, child and adolescent development, abnormal psychology, and research methods, and works closely with students to develop their written and oral communication skills, including communicating scientific information to the public. The passion and dedication demonstrated by Dr. Vannier is inspiring for her students. She takes

considerable care to ensure their progress in course work and makes a substantial effort to allow them to explore areas of interest to them and develop skills essential to their success. Last year, she was appointed to the Ad Hoc Committee on Remote Teaching and worked tirelessly to help students and faculty transition effectively to remote teaching. She has also chaired her department's curriculum committee, is a member of Senate's Learning and Teaching Development Committee, and is the representative for Science Atlantic which hosts an annual undergraduate research conference in psychology. She has earned numerous fellowships, awards, and prizes, including a SSHRC Explore grant to examine sexual wellbeing during adolescence and early adulthood, a SSHRC Postdoctoral Fellowship, and the Governor General's Gold Medal for Academic Excellence in Graduate Studies.

Award for Excellence in Part-time Teaching

Professor Gaila Friars has been Faculty Liaison for Field Practicums in the School of Social Work since 2009, and is an important mentor and supervisor of students during their social action and practise field placements. The integration seminars she holds throughout these placements promote individual student learning while also attending to student needs that arise in challenging work contexts. Her super-

vision regularly takes her around Maritime Canada which was particularly challenging as these placements continued during the pandemic. Professor Friars has been described as "a pillar of strength and support for our students and one who is able to negotiate and balance the needs of the students with the school's expectations and the needs of our community partners." She is a member of the New Brunswick Association of Social Workers and winner of their Raoul Léger Memorial Award for her significant contribution to the advancement of social work and social justice.





UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

Dr. Clive Baldwin is an internationally recognized expert in narrative research and a social worker with experience in mental health, community work, and the not-for-profit sector. His record of research excellence spans a range of subjects including dementia, new religious movements, transmedia, and transableism. He held a Canada Research Chair in Narrative Studies at STU from 2011 to 2021 and is the au-

thor or co-author of four books, along with numerous peer-reviewed articles and book chapters. He has explored the role of narrative in identity formation, ethics, and spirituality, and focused on developing narrative literacy in professional education and training in narrative ethics and narrative care. In his time at STU, he has generated more than \$2 million in external funding for his research. A highly collaborative scholar, Dr. Baldwin's mentoring and expertise have benefited students and faculty, and he has served externally as a PhD supervisor and a member of numerous thesis examination committees. He has also acted as a peer reviewer for 30 different academic journals.

UNIVERSITY SERVICE AWARD

Dr. Dawn Morgan has been a professor in the Department of English Language and Literature since 2004. She regularly teaches introductory courses, as well as courses on the 18th century English novel, the scientific revolution, and the emergence of human rights in literature during the American and French revolutionary periods. Her service to the discipline includes journal article peer reviews, literature

reviews, and conference roundtable discussions on Indigenizing literary studies. Her university service includes the Senate Honorary Degree Committee, Senate Research Committee, Senate Special Merit Awards Committee, the Committee on Appointments, Promotion, and Tenure, and the executive of the Faculty Association. As department chair, she led curricular reform, initiated a series of literary readings at the Pine Grove Care Home, and offered guidance to students presenting at conferences and applying for professional and graduate studies. She served on the Senate Committee on Indigenous Reconciliation that won the Student Union Outstanding Committee Award in 2019.





PROFESSOR EMERITUS

Dr. Gary Irwin-Kenyon is receiving the designation *professor emeritus*. He holds a BA and MA from Concordia, a PhD from UBC, and held post-doctoral positions at universities in the United States and Europe. He began his career at STU in 1987 when he was founding Chair of the Department of Gerontology and responsible for establishing degree and certificate programs. He also established a Visiting Chair



in Gerontology that brought internationally recognized scholars to STU to deliver the Creamer Lecture. He initiated the Fredericton 80+ Study of aging and helped establish the Third Age Centre, a not-for-profit organization that advocates on behalf of older adults. Dr. Irwin-Kenyon is a highly productive and respected scholar. He has authored more than 55 scholarly publications and was corecipient of the Theoretical Developments in Social Gerontology Award by the Gerontological Society of America. He was an editorial board member or reviewer for numerous scholarly journals, and guest editor of the *Canadian Journal on Aging, Aging and Society*, and *Journal of Aging Studies*.
