


ILOYE STU BECAUSE it is a small university that truly offers bia opportunities.


Association (STUISA)

BEYOND BORDERS

MOOT COURT

STU's extracurricular Moot Court teams have placed FIRST at the Nelson Mandela World Human Rights Moot Court Competition in Geneva and the Osgoode Cup in Toronto. The Moot Court class provides academic credit and courtroom experience and competes in the American Moot Court Association. The program has earned 28 top oralist awards at regional events and six top speaker awards at nationals.

INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGES

Spend a semester or an entire academic year in another part of the world while earning university credit for classes taken while there.

TRAVEL-STUDY

Travel to an international destination with classmates and a professor for a short-term travel-study experience. Between two and four weeks long, travel-study allows you to learn by using local setting and culture as material while earning university credit. Recent opportunities have taken students to England, Ireland, Italy, and Cuba.

FIND A PLACE TO CALL HOME IN ONE OF OUR FOUR RESIDENCE HALLS


Harrington: co-ed house located on main campus; includes rooms, as well as shared lounges, study spaces, bathrooms, and a kitchen.


Vanier: only all-female residence on campus; includes rooms, as well as shared lounges, study spaces, bathrooms, and a kitchen.

ADMISSION

International applicants must demonstrate academic strength in a high school program of university preparatory courses with subject distribution, other minimum requirements, and academic standing comparable to that required of Canadian applicants. Country-specific admission requirements are available at **STU.ca/international**.

Please note that meeting the minimum admission requirements does not guarantee admission.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY –

International students whose primary language is not English may be required to submit scores from one of the tests below:

- Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)
- International English Language Testing System (IELTS)
- Canadian Academic English Language Test (CAEL)

The St. Thomas University ETS Code is 0803

- Michigan English Language Assessment Battery (MELAB)
- Cambridge English Qualifications (CEQ)

Students with the following English language proficiency scores are eligible to take five regular academic courses, but may take integrated and assisted courses if they wish:

- TOEFL 89 (Internet-based)
- IELTS 6.5
- CAEL 60

- MELAB 80
- CEQ C or higher (C1 Advanced or C2 Proficiency)

ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE (ESL) PROGRAM

Students who meet the following minimum English language proficiency scores and the St. Thomas academic admission requirements are eligible for the ESL program:

- TOEFL 61 (Internet-based)
- IELTS 5.0
- CAEL 40, 50
- MELAB 69
- CEQ B2 First

The English as a Second Language (ESL) program provides students the opportunity to pursue their studies for credit while continuing to improve language skills in a planned, individualized program during the academic year (September to April).

There are no additional costs for ESL.

AP. IB. AND A-LEVEL TRANSFER CREDIT

Applicants who achieve the following scores on one of these tests are eligible for credit toward their degree:

- AP: 4 or 5
- IB Higher Level: 5, 6, or 7
- A-Level: C, or higher

St. Thomas University is SAT/ACT optional.

Submit your application for admission and your \$55 (CAD) application fee. Early Admission: October to December, 2019. Regular Admission: January to June, 2020.



Have your school send official transcripts and, if applicable, official English language proficiency scores to the Admissions Office.
